The Council, and its Chairman Dr. Hung Wing Tat in particular, ought to be heartily congratulated.

Looking ahead

Looking ahead, the list of tasks for the Institute remains long. As someone who has watched the growth of the Institute and shared many of its dreams. I would suggest that the Council in the coming session should give priority to the following:

First, to renew/further strengthen its fund raising *** strategies and activities as a long-term and standing effort to build up its financial capability. There is however an immediate and urgent target to acquire our own office, in view of the currently favourable property prices. "Old timers" will remember that this dream for a permanent office dates back more than a decade but has not been realized due to our limited fund and escalating prices. I now see this as a rare chance, one that probably will never return if we miss it!

- Second, to consolidate its local qualifying ** examination and related work. This will involve not only a comprehensive review of the examination syllabi, and of the standards and procedures for paper setting, invigilating, marking, external examining, etc., but also the establishment of standards and procedures for the recognition and/or exemption of programmes offered by many institutions. It will be mammoth task but it will be a timely and important step to take to safeguard the already excellent work that we are doing and will continue to do.
- Third, to renew its membership drive, especially to cultivate and increase the number of company/organization memberships, to strengthen the Fellowship scheme, and to speed up all procedures for membership application and processing.
- Fourth, to produce an Institute Newsletter regularly on *** the basis of the currently successful Newsletter of the Education and Training Committee to serve all members and to foster information flows within and outside the Institute.

On top of all of these, the Council, as the Institute grows and matures, is confronted with ever increasing demands and opportunities, hence there is an urgent need to improve its efficiency and to upgrade its image. Again, the Council will first look into only priority areas, viz., Organization and Management, including committee structure; Budgeting and Financial Procedures; and Public Relations, to see if more can be done to achieve higher efficiency and exposure.

I am sure you agree that many of these are gigantic undertakings, and I certainly hope I can count on your generous support and participation in their accomplishment.

Geographic Information System (GIS) in Transport

One Day Workshop

Geographic information system (GIS) is an information technology that is very useful to transport planning, operation, and management. Recent advancement in internet GIS has also made it to be a very useful tool in the dissemination of transport information in the internet and the development of intranet information system. When used together with global position system (GPS) and other vehicle location and traffic sensing systems, it forms an important component of the intelligent transport system (ITS). This one-day workshop will examine how GIS is used in transport planning, operation, and management and reveal the latest state-of-the-art development in North America, Australia, and Europe. It is intended for transport professionals, managers, and practitioners in the public and private sectors.

Instructors in the workshop include Dr. Lyna L.Wiggins, Associate Director of the Center for Urban Policy Research, Rutgers University, USA.; Prof. Mike Taylor, Director of the Transport Systems Centre, University of South Australia, Australia; and Prof. Anthony Gar-On Yeh, Assistant Director of the Centre of Urban Planning and Environmental Management and Director of the GIS Research Centre, University of Hong Kong.

Registration Fee (lunch not included) is HK\$1,500, and HK\$1,200 for members of professional institutes. A certificate will be given for the completion of the workshop.

EXAMINATIONS

Message from S.F. Ho, Chairman of the Examination Sub-Committee

The 1998 qualifying examination is over and its results have been released. The pass rate of the thirteen papers available this year is shown on the chart below. The papers in Law of Business and Carriage, and Air Transport Management had a 100% pass rate. Logistics Management Paper recorded the lowest pass rate.

On completion of the marking of examinations the following common mistakes were observed. The candidate:

- Tried to write everything he/she knew on the topic, regardless of the relevancy;
- Did not keep track of the time in answering the questions and was unable to complete the answers; and
- Did not read the questions carefully and did not answer the questions asked.

In fact all these mistakes can be avoided if one is well prepared before entering the examination hall. Planning and time management are important examination tools.

You may find the following hints helpful in reducing pressure of preparing for the examination and to improve you performance in it.

- Try to remember key headings and a set of about six points for each heading rather than trying to cram in disconnected details. The headings and points can serve as a framework for recalling the detail.
- To help recall of information. In addition to writing things down, you may find it helpful to talk through the material with another person or to a tape, or to pin diagrams or lists on a board where you can see them repeatedly.
- Plan your time properly during the examination to ensure that you get down what you know. Try to calculate the amount of time you should spend on each question according to its mark value before you start the examination.
- Plan responses to essay style questions by using the left-hand side blank page of the answer booklet to list issues and form a structural answer.



TASK VISIT

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On 17 July, a fine sunny Friday, 45 CIT members, including several guests, departed from Kowloon Tong and headed to Shenzhen Yantian International Container Terminal (YICT). Members were warmly welcomed by Ms Rosa Chiu, Corporate Communications Manager of the YICT, and her colleagues, at the main entrance of the YICT Administration Tower. A briefing seminar was conducted by both Rosa and her peers, which included the Organisation, operations, Shipping Companies, Customs, Warehouse-Bonded Warehouse for Exports and Imports, Distribution Services, Rail Services, Safety and Security Procedures, as well as the Phase II Development of YICT.

All members agreed that the visit had broadened their insights on the container port operations in the PRC. Both the advanced Container Terminal Management System (CTMS) and the sophisticated Ship Planning System (SHIPS) were very impressive. Members also enjoyed the tour of the Control Tower and of the advanced port facilities. Members had a great opportunity to have a panoramic view of the Phase I facilities and the grand site of the Phase II development while standing in the Control Room. Thanks were given to both Rosa and her peers, who had demonstrated very high professionalism in conducting the visit and in providing details during the Q&A time.

After a tasty lunch, we also visited the United Asia Terminals Limited (UATL) which is a leading provider of Container Freight Station logistics, warehousing and distribution services in South China. Members were impressed by the introduction of the Import Bonded Warehouse and the Customs-Approved Export Warehouse where the Customs Office is situated on the warehouse site. The briefing session concerning the customs procedures and the consolidation exercises was conveyed by Mr Raymond Mo, Managing Director of UATL and the visit to the bonded warehouse provided our members with first hand information on the scope of services and Customs and warehouse facilities of UATL. The visit lasted until nearly 5.00 p.m.
